Nevertheless, may I therefore clarify my position as any Treatment of Parody under the Copyright Regime should NOT contravene the provision of the Freedom of Expressions under the Bill of Rights Ordnance (Article 16).

Also, special care will need to be exercise to ensure Article 16 Section 3 (b) will not be miscontrued to criminalise Parody.

With the current political structure of Hong Kong, I do realise this will be particularly tricky, and I do hope the Civil Service and Judiciary of Hong Kong would retain their proud traditions of professional independence to safeguard the interest of the Citizens of Hong Kong.
